ANTH 309: ST: THEORIES FOR THE ORIGIN OF AGRICULTURE

The development of agriculture - the transition from hunting and gathering to food production - has long been regarded as one of the most important changes in human history with far reaching consequences right down to the present. It is ultimately associated with the development of "civilizations" and with our now global way of life. In this class we will examine the major theories for the origin of agriculture paying particular attention to demographic arguments and evolutionary perspectives.

ANTH 329: ST: POLITICS OF HEALTH IN THE MIDDLE EAST

This course is an introduction to cultures and politics of illness, health, and healing in the Middle East and North Africa. It analyzes health from a socio-historical perspective and explores how medical knowledges and practices vary across cultural and historical contexts within the region. Among the topics that the course will cover are cultures of healing and understandings of health in the Ottoman Empire; legacies of colonial medicine and psychiatry in North Africa; emergence of public health programs in Turkey and Egypt; organ transplants and sexual and reproductive health across MENA; and issues of gender and mental health in post-conflict zones.
