Anthropology confronts the challenges of culture in the contemporary social world. The special mandate of the field is to discover new and less harmful ways of perceiving, understanding, reporting on, and therefore validating the different experiences, histories, and values of peoples and communities from all parts of the world. The objective of this course, *Anthropological Perspectives on Global Irish Culture*, is to explore, in addition to Anthropology's history and major sub-fields, how the Irish from ancient times to the present negotiated the global landscapes of such places as North and South America, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and more. Topics will include the Irish monastic presence on the continent of Europe, the coming of Vikings, Normans, and colonial settlers, the movement from Irish to English, and the global phenomena of Irish music and dance. Students are encouraged to see themselves as anthropologists from the first day of class.

ANTH 336: OSTEOLOGY AND FORENSICS

Students will obtain knowledge of the anatomy of the human skeleton, including the identification and analysis of fragmentary skeletal material. Students will be introduced to basic forensic analyses.
